Barry S. Strauss (born November 27, 1953) is an American historian. He is a professor of history and humanistic studies at <u>Cornell University</u>, and a visiting Corliss Page Dean Fellow at the Hoover Institution.

Life and work

Strauss is an expert on <u>ancient military history</u> and has written or edited numerous books, including *The Battle of Salamis* (2004), *The Trojan War* (2006), *The*

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Spartacus War (2009), Masters of Command (2013), The Death of Caesar (2015), Ten Caesars (2019), and The War That Made The Roman Empire (March 2022). His books have been translated into nineteen languages.

Strauss holds a <u>B.A.</u> from <u>Cornell</u> and a <u>Ph.D.</u> from <u>Yale</u> (advised by <u>Donald Kagan</u>) and has been awarded fellowships by the <u>National Endowment for the Humanities</u>, the <u>American School of Classical Studies at Athens</u>, the <u>American Academy in Rome</u>, the <u>MacDowell Colony for the Arts</u>, the <u>Korea Foundation</u>, and the <u>Killam Foundation of Canada</u>. He is an honorary citizen of Salamis, Greece. He is Director of Cornell's Program on Freedom and Free Societies and past Director of its Peace Studies Program. [1]

Strauss is editor of *Turning Points in Ancient History*, a series of books from <u>Princeton University</u> Press. He sits on the editorial boards of <u>MHQ</u>: <u>The Quarterly Journal of Military History</u>, <u>Historically Speaking</u>: <u>The Bulletin of the Historical Society</u>, <u>The International Journal of the Classical Tradition</u>, and <u>Strategika</u>.

At Cornell, he teaches courses on the history of <u>ancient Greece</u>, war and peace in the ancient world, history of battle, introduction to military history, and specialized topics in ancient history.

Strauss is an avid rower. In 1999, he published *Rowing Against the Current: On Learning to Scull at Forty* (Scribner). He has appeared in more than a dozen television documentaries. He has published op-ed pieces in *The Wall Street Journal*, *The Washington Post*, the *Los Angeles Times*, *USA Today*, and *Newsday*, been interviewed on <u>NPR</u> and the <u>BBC</u>, and has been quoted on the front page of *The Wall Street Journal* and in other major newspapers.

He lives in Ithaca, New York.
